History of the Marshall House - Location of the Victorian Lady

The Marshall House is one of the key structures in the North Milford Historic District. Most of the buildings in the District were constructed before 1860. The Marshall House is located on the main street in the District where there are several prominent early 19th century structures. There has been little significant intrusions of modern buildings in this area. Like many of the buildings on this street, the Marshall House has historically been used for business and residence.

The Marshall House was originally constructed as two separate buildings. John Laws, a brick mason, purchased the property in 1787. It was one of the original lots sold by Milford co-founder, Joseph Oliver. Laws constructed a 2 1/2 story, three bay, gable roof, brick structure that is today the east front section of the house. After Laws died, his widow, Elizabeth sold the property to John Pleasanton in 1789. It changed hands 3 times and then was in the hands of Louder Layton. A bank was then in operation at this location from 1812-1827. This was the first bank in Milford.

In 1879 Mr. Andrew Donnell purchased both houses for his daughter, Mary Louis Marshall and her husband, Dr. George William Marshall. The two adjacent buildings were remodeled to create one house. Dr. Marshall used the building for his residence until his death in 1915. It continued to be used as a Dr's office and residence by his sons Dr. William Marshall (known as Dr. Wid) and Dr. Samuel Marshall. With the death of Dr. Wid, the practice of medicine ceased to be carried on at the Marshall House but Rosanna Marshall, Wid's widow lived there until her death in 1983. It was then vacant until it became the Banking House Inn in 1985, a fine restaurant and bed and breakfast.

Standing on the banks of the Mispillion, adjacent to Milford's new Riverwalk, the Marshall House is a prominent landmark reminding the public of Milford's past.
